This Week in Labor History:

On May 23rd, 1903, as many as 100,000 Philadelphia-area textile workers went on strike in order to demand shorter workweeks and less onerous working conditions for child laborers (who were often forced to work long nightshifts). The famous labor activist Mother Jones soon arrived in Philadelphia to offer her support, and proceeded to use the strike as an occasion to convince the public and policymakers of the need to abolish child labor altogether. While the strike ultimately failed, the strike and Jones' support raised national awareness of ongoing problems in the workplace that many states would go on to address with new, Progressive Era legislation.
